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

DIC kicked off the New Year with groundbreaking news about awarding the construction of the Louvre Abu Dhabi to Arabtec-led joint venture with Constructora San Jose SA and Oger Abu Dhabi LLC. This world-class museum, set to open in the Saadiyat Cultural District in 2015, has already celebrated completion of the infrastructure and construction is now underway.

The contract, valued at AED 2.4 billion, signifies a major milestone in the progress of the Louvre Abu Dhabi that has already launched a robust programme marking major achievements during the various upcoming stages of development.

"The announcement reflects Abu Dhabi's commitment to deliver the iconic museums on Saadiyat as a major world cultural exchange platform. Furthermore, this step signifies a major milestone for our company and the progress of the Louvre Abu Dhabi. This is the first museum set to open in the Saadiyat Cultural District in 2015 and will mark significant progress in cross-cultural

dialogue through its universal themes and diverse exhibits," stated HE Sheikh Sultan bin Tahnoon Al Nahvan, Chairman of Abu Dhabi Tourism & Culture Authority (TCA Abu Dhabi) and TDIC.

With a built up area of 64,000 square metres. Louvre Abu Dhabi is conceived as a complex of pavilions, plazas, alleyways and canals, evoking the image of a city floating on the sea.

Hovering over the complex will be a form inspired by traditional Arabic architecture: a vast. shallow dome - some 180 metres in diameter perforated with interlaced patterns so that a magical, diffused light will filter through.

"The construction phase of the Louvre Abu Dhabi is an important milestone in the museum's life as it celebrates the significant work that has been achieved in the development of the cultural programme of the Louvre Abu Dhabi and its art collection," said Mubarak Hamad Al Muhairi, Director General of TCA Abu Dhabi and Managing Director of TDIC.

"This new landmark project will earn international appreciation for its distinctive design and collection with artworks of historical and sociological significance."







Construction progress

he Louvre Abu Dhabi has so far achieved major developmental milestones with the finishing of the building's detailed design and the completion of the infrastructure, which encompassed marine, excavation, piling and substructure works.

A temporary platform in the sea, where the entire building will be constructed on, was built in 2009 to allow all works to take place in a dry environment. Upon completion of the building, including the marine works, the 40-metre high concrete walls currently built in the sand will be removed to allow seawater to flow in gradually. More than 4,000 steel and reinforced concrete piles – a total volume of 21,000 cubic metres of concrete – were driven into the ground to serve as a base for the Louvre Abu Dhabi building.

Now that construction has commenced, the museum's concrete frame is to be completed by the first quarter of 2014. Work on the geometric lace dome, will be completed by the end of 2014 and result in an enchanting 'rain of light'. The final stage includes marine works and removal of temporary land platforms which will be completed in 2015 when this world-class building transforms into an island of its own.



Museum culture

esigned by Pritzker-prize winning architect Jean Nouvel, the Louvre Abu Dhabi will encompass 9,200 square metres of art galleries. The 6,000-square-metre Permanent Gallery will house the museum's permanent collection taking the visitor through a universal journey from the most ancient to contemporary through art works from different civilisations. The Temporary Gallery will be a dedicated space of 2,000 square meters presenting temporary exhibitions of international standards.

The Louvre Abu Dhabi will showcase the interrelationships among artistic

achievements from different cultures around the world - from the most immemorial to the very latest, across borders of technique and geography.

Louvre Abu Dhabi is developing its own permanent collection, which will be enriched by loans from 12 French museums including Musée du Louvre, Musée d'Orsay, Musée du Quai Branly, and Centre Pompidou. Louvre Abu Dhabi is being developed with the expertise of the Agence France-Muséums and in partnership with the Musée du Louvre, renowned for its museological excellence since its foundation in 1793.

Who's Arabtec?

Location, location, location



Making of a museum city

he 'museum city' of Louvre
Abu Dhabi will be housed in a
building designed by Pritzker
Prize winning architect Jean Nouvel.
Ever aware of context, Nouvel's
museum design was based on two
key principles. The first key principle
is the creation of the museum city as
a metaphor of the traditional Arabic
souk, with small shaded passages

where individual volumes become houses of artwork. The Second key principle is the protection of this museum city, where the pedestrian areas and the nested artworks are roofed by a large dome. The dome is considered an interpretation of the traditional key element of Islamic and Arabic architecture yet a modern proposition.





The architecture puts together sets of large rooms. The sum of these sets, punctuated by patios, thresholds, transparent spaces and tilt-ups, creates a piece of the city that's sheltered by the dome, shot through with rays of sunshine. What it makes you feel, here, in Abu Dhabi, is the permanence of ephemeral emotions flooding in from different horizons.

The game is on!

It's capture season on Sir Bani Yas and our dedicated Conservation Team is on a mission to relocate over 6,000 animals

he Conservation Team on Sir Bani Yas Island started their game capture season after long summer preparations. During the hot and humid summer months a limited amount of hands-on work can be done with the wildlife, since handling or capturing can harm or stress the animals in such weather conditions.

Now that the game capture season, which runs from September to May, is

on, the team has a very large job ahead. The animal populations on Sir Bani Yas are expanding and the numbers are becoming too great for the area. The sexes are therefore going to be separated into different areas and enclosures to slow down breeding. For this to be entirely successful, over 6,000 animals need to be relocated to various areas on the island.

Due to the large numbers that need to be moved, the team uses passive capture techniques to catch the animals. This usually involves animals being fed in a certain fenced area so they can become habituated to feeding on that particular location. This feed area will be part of a system of gates, passages and smaller rooms. The animals are then closed into the feed area and filtered through the passage system and divided

into males and females, and according to their species. Animals that are captured are checked for injuries and illnesses, or their level of fitness related to certain good husbandry practices such as hoof trimming of wild sheep and wild goat species.

This is a very large, time-consuming project which will take the team several years to complete fully. The end of 2012 witnessed the release of a number of Barbary Sheep (Ammotragus lervia), one more male giraffe (Giraffa camelopardalis reticulata) and some Urial Sheep (Ovis orientalis) into the Arabian Wildlife Park to add to the animal diversity. All this adds an enriching experience for visitors embarking on the nature and wildlife drives.

Animal of the month

Greater Rhea (Rhea americana)

here are several different species and subspecies of rhea which all originate from South America.

The Greater Rhea is found specifically in central and eastern Brazil and lives in bush land habitat near to rivers. The rhea feeds on plants, leaves, roots, seeds, lizards, insects and some carrion. In the wild, they can sometimes live in flocks of up to 100 birds.

Sir Bani Yas currently has 34 rheas and two chicks. The chicks are born striped to aid their camouflage and make it easier for them to hide from predators. Rheas are polygamous with males breeding between two and twelve females. The male builds a nest in the form of a simple scrape in the ground and lines the bottom with grass or leaves. Each of the females lays her eggs in the same nest; the male then incubates all the eggs.

All the chicks in the nest will hatch within 36 hours of each other. The females

may mate with more than one male and therefore lay several clutches of eggs in different nests. The males are in charge of caring and protecting the young chicks and will charge at any predators that approach their chicks. The yellow and black striped chicks slowly grow feathers and reach full adult size at six months old. Rheas, however, do not breed until they reach two years old.



The numbers of Greater rhea in the wild are dwindling due to loss of habitat and so preservation efforts, such as on Sir Bani Yas, are highly important to save them from nearing extinction.




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

What's a green building?

Dr Nathalie Staelens spreads a green message at environmental conference



r Nathalie Staelens, TDIC's head of environmental services, recently participated at the annual "Building Sustainability into the Middle East 2012" conference that took place at the Westin Abu Dhabi Golf Resort & Spa.

Nathalie addressed the audience on topics related to sound environmental practices implemented on Saadiyat island and emphasised TDIC's sustainable efforts enforced throughout the construction phases of our developments. She also showcased the sustainability designs of Louvre Abu Dhabi.

Best practice principles for sustainable communities and built environment designs are implemented utilising green building guidelines for developments throughout Saadiyat Island.

TDIC utilises the Estidama Pearl Rating System Guidelines, as well as international green building standards. Estidama is Abu Dhabi's building design methodology for constructing and operating buildings and communities more sustainably.

The event gathered 150 sustainability professionals from regional design, architecture, engineering and construction firms. Speakers from Abu Dhabi Urban Planning Council, Aldar Properties, Six Construct, Woods Bagot and Mott MacDonald had also attended the conference.

Good green guidelines

Through the adoption of green building guidelines, water and energy consumption will be minimised; renewable energy and materials sources sought; waste disposal and pollution significantly reduced; longevity built into design of both interior and exterior environments; ecological protection and enhancement through development of green spaces emphasised; and sustainable transportation facilities and access provided.

Well done, Sir!

Workers on Sir Bani Yas Island embrace English learning course

ur educational opportunities on Desert Islands are further enriching the lives of workers who are participating in various exercises that are broadening their horizons and career prospects.

Over the past three years, over 50 students have graduated through the Sir Bani Yas Education and Training Centre. They were guided by our Workplace English Literacy Learning (WELL) course in the use of the English language with focus on specific work-related topics.

The programme, which is currently engaging the fifth batch of students is being taught voluntarily by a qualified British teacher living on Sir Bani Yas providing spoken and written communication courses twice a week.

There is also a plan to offer computer courses which aims to contribute to the efficiency of the teams particularly as foremen can now write weekly reports to their management. This has only been possible through the support of TDIC which dedicated 15 computers to the Jeanning centre.



In the line of fire

TDIC organised a second fire and evacuation training and graduated 10 wardens

DIC recently organised a second Fire and Evacuation training, following the success of the first programme which had previously graduated 19 wardens for Sir Bani Yas Island. The one-day training, which took place at TDIC's headquarters and on Saadiyat, focussed on understanding the characteristics of fire and use of fire-fighting equipment. The 10 participants who passed the training were successfully designated as Fire and Evacuation Wardens.

"Our priority is to preserve lives. We are not fire fighters, but we train to lead you out to safety," says Wayne Taylor, Health and Safety Manager of TDIC's Operations team, who had presented to the group. The wardens also learned that using the wrong methods to combat fire can worsen situations. "Remove one element and a fire cannot start or sustain itself. That's why we have to deal with the source of the fire," said Taylor.



Role of a fire warden

A fire warden's mission is to lead people to safety during fires. They become the point of contact with fire-fighters to inform them about the nature of the fire and if any people are in the building.

What to do in case of a fire

- Do not block fire exits, call points or fire extinguishers.
- Adhere to the 'no smoking' policy.
- Don't store personal items close to hazardous spots such as under the table or near electrical sockets.
- Do not wedge fire doors open.
- ➤ Always place rubbish in waste bins.
- Make note of signage across TDIC to clarify evacuation points and the positions of fire wardens in the building.

Clean-up act

Abu Dhabi residents, TDIC staff and contractors participate in a clean up on Saadiyat Beach

DIC organised a clean-up initiative on Saadiyat Beach, which took place in December as part of the annual 'Clean Up UAE 2012' campaign organised by the Emirates Environment Group.

Scores of volunteers from the wider Abu Dhabi community took part in the event which occurred along the Saadiyat Beach dune protection zone, near the Monte-Carlo Beach Club, Saadiyat. This brought together Saadiyat residents and TDIC's staff and their families alongside Monte-Carlo Beach Club staff, conservationists, members of 1st Abu Dhabi Scout Group and TDIC's contractors – Al



Futtaim Carillion, Proscape and Dhabi Contracting – who are involved in the construction of the island's world-class projects. The waste contracting company Veolia Environmental Services also took part by collecting the waste for recycling.

Meanwhile, TDIC also organised a clean-up initiative that took place on Sir Bani Yas Island. In total, nearly 200 people removed approximately 30 cubic metres of waste, amounting to around six tonnes, from over 10 kilometres of beaches and dunes on Saadiyat and Sir Bani Yas islands. Nearly all waste collected was marine debris that had washed up on the shorelines of the islands.

My side of the mountain

Stefan Hanekom recounts his expedition to Kilimanjaro, Africa's tallest mountain

ilimanjaro is the highest summit in Africa and the tallest free standing mountain in the world. At 5,895 metres, it rises dramatically above the dusty East African plains with its impressive snow-capped summit. I was told Kilimanjaro means "difficult to conquer", and I agree.

You need to be physically and mentally prepared to climb Kilimanjaro and you certainly need determination and willpower. It was for these exact reasons that I made the conscious decision of taking up this challenge.

I reached Kilimanjaro Airport in Tanzania on an early mid-August morning as the tropical rainy season was coming to an end, and a fresh new adventure awaited me. The first night I stayed in the Sal Salinero Hotel which was in located in Moshi. I must have checked my gear more than ten times that evening

ensuring I had everything. The excitement was keeping me wide awake most of the night as I knew for the next six days, I will be challenged physically and mentally, and failure is not an option.

There were various routes to choose from to reach the summit. I chose the Machame Route, being the most popular and scenic route. It is also the second most difficult route to the summit, after the Umbwe Route. Here's a summary of my trip, covering an estimated distance travelled by foot of 100 kilometres to the summit and back.

Day 1

We were transported from the Sal Salinero Hotel to the Machame Gate (1828m) where we started the trek to Machame Camp (3020m). The jungle-like terrain was quite tiring, particularly the final two hours, as it was raining, and we were cold and wet for most of the day. We slept in single-man tents and ate the necessary proteins and carbs to restore lost energy.

Day 2

Mostly every day we were woken up around 6am with hot ginger tea and basic breakfast consisting of porridge and omelettes. We proceeded with the trek to Shira Camp (3847m) on the southern edge of a plateau. The terrain was semi-desert like and very difficult to manoeuvre over the gravel and rocks.

Day 3

We recommenced with the trek to Lava Tower (4600m) where we had lunch. We descended to Barranco Camp (3984m) where we camped for the night and acclimatized for the summit. Acclimatization is the process of the body adjusting to the decreasing availability of oxygen. It is a slow process, taking place over a period of days whilst being on the mountain. As the amount of oxygen in the lungs decreases, the blood becomes less

and less efficient at acquiring and transporting oxygen. This means that no matter how fast one breathes, attaining normal blood levels of oxygen is not possible at high altitude.

Day 4

We trekked to Barafu Camp (4681m) via the 250-metre-high Breach Wall across the valley from Barranco. This was quite challenging and scary, we had no ropes and one false move could mean you will fall to the bottom. There were three rises and falls before we reached Karanga Camp (4040m), had lunch, and then departed to Barafu, which we reached around 6pm. The idea was to sleep as soon as possible since our summit attempt would start at midnight. It was good that we prepared our gear for the summit before going to sleep, as we felt disoriented when we woke up for the summit attempt

Day 5

Around midnight, after being woken up with ginger tea and biscuits, we quit camp for the summit attempt via Stella Point (5752m) to the summit, Uhuru Peak. It was extremely windy, and with sub-zero temperatures I knew this would be challenging. The day turned out to be extremely difficult, particularly the final 500 metres to Uhuru Peak.

"Keep your thoughts positive, as your thoughts become your words.



Keep your words positive, as your words become your actions. Keep your actions positive, as your actions become your destiny - you can do it!" These words which our guide spoke during the final few 100 meters before the summit gave me the much needed motivation and strength to get myself to the top.

Seven hours after leaving Barafu camp and covering a distance of 4.5 kilometres, I reached Uhuru Peak, towering 5,895 metres over Africa. I only spent 15 minutes on the summit due to the lack of oxygen and also the minus 18 degrees temperature. We then descended back to Barafu where we rested for an hour or so before continuing down to Millennium Camp (3820m) where we had dinner and slept soundly.


Day 6

The next morning we descended to Mweka Gate (1641m) where we received our certificate for having reached the summit and were transferred back to Sal Salinero Hotel for a long overdue hot shower.

Join me this year...

I invite you to join me this year for another challenge, which may again include Kilimanjaro as well as a trip to South America to take on Aconcagua mountain, measuring a 1000 meters higher than Kilimanjaro, also one of the seven summits.

am a glass addict. I love bright colours and the reflective quality of glass and leaped at the chance to take a class in cutting glass, also known as stained glass, over 15 years ago.

Stained glass artists do not paint glass. We purchase coloured and textured glass that is blown and pressed. We cut it into shapes and solder it together into panels, windows, lamps and other objects.

Glass artists work in traditional lead cane as well as copper foil techniques. I prefer the copper foil technique because it allows me to be more creative.

I brought my tools with me to the UAE but it took a while to get set up because it was initially hard to find materials here. I met a fellow glass artist and we have been able to source enough glass and materials to be able to pursue our passion. We occasionally do art shows together and find that we spend a lot of time educating people about what we do.

Working with glass is challenging. You have to be careful and pay attention to what you are doing so that you do not waste materials. Different glasses have their own personalities and you have to make sure that it breaks the way you want. I actually find working with glass relaxing because it forces me to pay attention to what I am doing and I forget about what I might have been worrying about.


I have a studio in my home and usually put in a couple of hours over the weekend working on projects. I consider myself a qualified

artisan. I have friends who are master craftsmen and they do amazing projects including major restoration work.

I believe inspiration comes from nature, and that reflects in the colours or textures of the glass or from patterns I see. I am also a photographer and occasionally create

pieces based on my own work.

One of the things I love about living in Abu Dhabi is the colour of the tropical water here. I have found some beautiful teal and turquoise glass and recently completed a tropical sea life series inspired by Abu Dhabi.

The basboosa, or nammoora, is Middle Eastern sweet dish made of semolina or farina soaked in syrup.

- · I cup semolina (called sameed in
- · I cup sugar
- · I cup coconut powder
- · Itsp baking powder · Itsp vanilla extract
- · 1 egg
 · 1/4 cup melted butter
- · 3/4 cup yoghurt

Equal parts sugar and water Few drops of rose water (optional)

Preheat oven to 170 degrees. Whip the egg with the vanilla extract. Mix all the ingredients together, then pour into a 40cm butter-sprayed shallow baking dish. Let this bake for 40 minutes or until it is golden brown. Meanwhile, heat on the oven equal parts sugar and water till slightly thickened into a syrup. You can add a few drops of rose water to the syrup for a better taste.

After the basboosa cools for to 2 to 3 minutes, pour the syrup on top of it. Now you are ready to enjoy this mouthwatering Arabic delight.

Basboosa is best served warm or room temperature.




