It has been an exciting couple of months for us at TDIC. First of all, I am very proud to say that TDIC has been recently acknowledged by three top global independent credit rating agencies which have further put us in the regional limelight. This clearly highlights us as a master developer working to fulfil Abu Dhabi's 2030 ambition as a world-class destination.

This comes despite the sharp decline in the world's economy which has dominated headlines for quite some time and which we certainly cannot ignore. However, at TDIC we have the support and infrastructure to ensure that we are better placed in this uncertain period.

We are still very much on track on all of our announced developments. In fact, the first lane will be connected by mid-April (but not to used for public access at the moment).

As I mentioned in our last issue, our plans to relocate selected departments to the new building next door (commonly referred to as the DV Building) are progressing. The first members of staff are currently relocating, starting with the Design, Delivery, Information Communications Technology (ICT), Project Management and Troon Management teams. This will be followed by the Commercial and Human Resources departments. At the same time, a few teams will

be relocating to their new office spaces in the main HQ building.

Many of you may have had the chance to download our Evolution update I had sent detailing the progress of our organisational developments and the relocation plan.

This move is extremely positive for TDIC and has clear indication of the rapid progress that we are making. I want to assure everyone that despite being in different buildings we are still one family – the TDIC family.

However, being in different locations will bring challenges and will mean a period of readjustments, where we will have to ensure that everyone continues to work in the same direction.

I firmly believe that communication is key. Transparent and consistent communication is vital in any business, but this is especially true when an organisation goes through a period of change, such as our relocation. This doesn't just mean how the management communicates to staff - it is much more than this. I want all of the staff in TDIC to feel that they have a voice and that their opinion is valued.

As part of our drive to develop a family atmosphere at TDIC, plans for a family outing to celebrate our third anniversary are being drawn up. The event has still to be decided and we would encourage everyone who has an idea of what makes a great experience to share their ideas with the Events Team. I look forward to seeing you all at the family outing.

TDIC's cultural vision is brought to life with Talking Art series

ebruary was the month when we went madly in love – with our art exhibitions of course. As part of our cultural programme to welcome the world to experience Abu Dhabi, we introduced a three-month "Talking Art" series of special public programmes. These included a series of lectures, presentations and discussions bringing together local and international artists. Scheduled in conjunction with the landmark exhibition *Emirati Expressions*, this was the first comprehensive survey of contemporary art from the UAE which is still being held at the Emirates Palace until April 16. The series brings together Emirati artists in conversation with representatives of the Royal Academy of Arts in London, Solomon R Guggenheim Foundation, New York Film Academy, Goethe-Institut, the University of Sharjah College of Fine Arts and Design, Sharjah Biennial, the UAE Pavilion at the Venice Biennale, several UAE art galleries and Zayed University.





The series began with a three-day programme with the UK's Royal Academy of Arts, featuring lectures, artists' presentations and panel discussions that offer insight into the role art institutions play in the development of a vibrant cultural scene.

Other highlights included a series of sessions led by international artists and curators and organised by the Guggenheim Foundation, an evening of films by emerging Emirati filmmakers presented by the New York Film Academy, panel discussions led by curators of the Sharjah Biennial and the UAE Pavilion at the Venice Biennale and workshops with artists such as Isak Berbic and Susan Hefuna. Zayed University students also created a large collage with children and screen their film of visitor reactions to *Emirati Expressions*.


TDIC gears up for its Guggenheim Abu Dhabi Museum's groundbreaking ceremony

ater this year, we will take an important step forward with our development of Saadiyat Island with the groundbreaking ceremony for the Guggenheim Abu Dhabi Museum. In preparation for this event, our Chairman HE Sheikh Sultan, Managing Director Mubarak Al Muhairi and CEO Lee Tabler met with the project's architect Frank Gehry along with other Guggenheim members for an architectural design update and site tour. The group included Richard Armstrong, the Director of the Solomon R Guggenheim Foundation and Museum, Juan Ignacio Vidarte, Chief Officer for Global Strategies for the Guggenheim Foundation and Frederick Henry, Guggenheim Foundation Trustee. The ceremony is certainly a major event for TDIC and one which carries much significance in Abu Dhabi's development to become a leading international cultural destination.

So, in preparation for this prestigious occasion we at *TDEyeSee* thought it would useful to do a little research on Frank Gehry and the plans for the Guggenheim Abu Dhabi and share them with you.

Guggenheim Abu Dhabi Museum

The Guggenheim Abu Dhabi Museum, scheduled to open in 2012/2013, will present modern and contemporary art from the Solomon R Guggenheim Foundation collection and its own permanent masterpieces. At 42,000 square metres the Abu Dhabi Museum will be the world's largest Guggenheim facility. It will be home to 12,000 square metres of permanent art collections and special exhibition galleries, an arts and technology centre, children's art education facility, archives, library research centre and a state-ofthe-art conservation laboratory.



Frank Gehry

Born in Canada, Frank Gehry is best-known for iconic buildings such as the titaniumcovered Guggenheim Museum in Bilbao, Spain, Walt Disney Concert Hall in downtown Los Angeles and the Experience Music Project in Seattle. Apparently, he was an extremely creative child who had been inspired to use different building materials in his architectural designs from his childhood experiences from playing at his grandfather's hardware store.

TOURING ITALIANS

TDIC plays host to top Italian delegation



DIC was the first destination in a whistle-stop visit of Abu Dhabi for a 30-strong Italian tourism delegation. Led by the country's newly-appointed Minister for Tourism, Michela Brambilla, the group was in the UAE to build tourism links with Abu Dhabi.

They were also in the capital to mark the opening of the new ADTA offices in Rome and Milan as well as to celebrate Etihad Airways' services to Italy. The Abu Dhabi-based carrier will increase the number of direct flights they offer to Milan beginning the end of March, from three to five flights a week.

The party, made up of Italian media and tour operators, visited TDIC where they were welcomed by our Chairman HE Sheikh Sultan, Managing Director Mubarak Al Muhairi, Chief Operating Officer Ahmed Hussein and Executive Director of Marketing and PR Alan Gordon. They were introduced to the company via our corporate DVD in the in-house theatre, toured the Experiential Centre before being hosted to a dinner on the cafeteria terrace.

Minister Brambila described the evening as: "very well organised and highly informative. TDIC's projects are

It's now 'plane' easy to get to Sir Bani Yas Island



Getting to Sir Bani Yas Island, part of the Desert Islands archipelago, has been made much easier with the introduction of a new air service. The Desert Island flights, which began in January with an eight-seater Cessna Caravan, leaves from Abu Dhabi airport every Thursday and Saturday and significantly reduces the travel time to the island. To meet rising visitor demand, TDIC also introduced its 50-seater Bombardier Dash-8 adding two more weekly flights. Situated approximately 8 kilometres from the shore and 170km from the city of Abu Dhabi, getting to Sir Bani Yas has previously been quite an adventure when visitors were required to take a twoand-half hour car journey, followed by a boat crossing. However, you can now travel to the 87 square kilometre island in style and in just under 45 minutes.

Desert Island's Senior Marketing Manager Lars Nielsen was clearly delighted at the introduction of the flights and what it means to the future development of the resort.

"Sir Bani Yas Island is a truly remarkable destination, which offers visitors some of the most unspoiled natural environment in the UAE. On top of this there is also a luxury hotel, Arabian Wildlife Park and more activities than anyone could hope to complete in a weekend. However, in the past people may have been put off visiting the island by the long journey, but now, there is just no excuse," he said. The flights will significantly reduce the travel time and means that a visit to our award winning hotel, Desert Island Resort and Spa, or the famous Arabian wildlife park, which contains one of the world's largest herds of Arabian Oryx, is now a realistic family fun day out. The flights will be operated on behalf of TDIC - the Cessna Caravan by the regional private jet operator Empire Aviation and the Dash-8 by Abu Dhabi Aviation. BRIDGING THE WAY

TDIC execs take a tour of up-andcoming Saadiyat Bridge



DIC CEO Lee Tabler took a stroll on Saadiyat Bridge and inspected the site. He was joined with several colleagues including Executive Director of Development Stuart Magee, Executive Director of Marketing and PR Alan Gordon, Human Resources Director Leon Geldenhuys, Arts and Cultural Advisor Rita Aoun and Saadiyat's Infrastructure Director Andrew Seymour.

A major milestone in Saadiyat Island's development, TDIC's flagship Saadiyat Bridge project, is now 85 per cent completed and on schedule to meet its planned completion date in September 2009.

The AED 850 million bridge will be 1,450 metres in length and will be a 10-lane



highway, five lanes in each direction, with additional corridors for two future rail lines.

The bridge is set to become one of the world's great non-suspension bridges and will connect Saadiyat Island with Abu Dhabi city from the Mina Zayed

main port area, reducing the journey to just a five-minute drive. The bridge will eventually connect with the 6.5-kilometre Saadiyat Link road, also under construction, connecting Abu Dhabi's Shahama district with Saadiyat Island.

HOME FOLDER

When logged in to the TDIC network, Drive Z is your home or private folder. Only you will have access to this folder and all files inside this folder are backed up on a daily basis.

THESAURUS IN MICROSOFT WORD

In Microsoft Word, you can bring up Thesaurus by simply pressing Shift-F7. Open Microsoft Word and begin typing your document. When a word comes up you would like to use the Thesaurus for, press Shift and the F7 key to activate the Thesaurus and a list of synonyms (and sometimes antonyms) is generated by the Thesaurus.

his is Toby Young's story of how he tried to "takeover" Manhattan via his newly acquired job at *Vanity Fair* magazine. But as with most best-laid plans, his



goes greatly awry as he reels from one social ostracised scenario to the next - both deliberate and accidental.

When we first meet Toby, he is attempting to gatecrash the Oscar's *Vanity Fair* party. It is here that we get our first glimpse into our protagonist's psyche as he steals his best friend's identity. Toby and bodyguards engage in an exchange of words that result in our hero being unceremoniously ejected from the venue; this sets the tone for the rest of the novel.

Toby has created career writing about his failed career. How could we ignore the irony of it all? Yet we revel in his foibles as he gets blacklisted from every hip joint in New York and alienates the New York media establishment. Our hero is not beyond redemption and as with any good story finds the love of a good woman.

If you are looking for an easy read give this a go. It will help to while away those hours on those long plane rides.
